Re: Education Reform Candidates Run Up the Score on AEA, Go Perfect 13 for 13

in Targeted Races

The 2014 election cycle in Alabama was historic. For the first time, the Alabama Education Association was challenged by a coalition of groups dedicated to education reform, including the Alabama Federation for Children PAC (AFC PAC), affiliated with the American Federation for Children, the state's voice for educational choice.

Just mere months after spending \$7 million and experiencing devastating defeats in the primary election, the Alabama Education Association doubled down, this time backing pro-union Democratic candidates. The union spent another \$5 million during the general election to elect candidates sympathetic to their goal of maintaining the status quo in education. Just like the primary, voters in Alabama saw through the rhetoric and voted for a legislative majority that supports educational options for families in Alabama.

The Alabama Federation for Children PAC made an unprecedented investment in Alabama, during both the primary and the general elections. Even though AEA was able to outspend AFC PAC by as much as 27 to 1 in certain targeted races, AFC was successful in helping to defend legislators who voted for the Alabama Accountability Act, elect candidates in open seats who professed a desire to see more educational choice, such as creating the state's first charter school law, and defeat incumbent legislators who did not support educational choice.

The Alabama Federation for Children PAC is proud to have helped re-elect the strong leaders who championed the Alabama Accountability Act, Senate Pro-Tem Del Marsh and Speaker of the House Mike Hubbard. We are also pleased to have helped defeat anti-school

choice incumbents like Republican Todd Greeson and Democrat John Robinson. But most importantly, AFC is excited about the next four years for Alabama families with a strong school choice majority in the legislature.
