RE: NEVADA VOTERS HOLD POSITIVE VIEW OF EDUCATION SAVINGS ACCOUNTS

DATE: AUGUST 19, 2015

The Tarrance Group is pleased to present the following findings from this recent survey of the Nevada electorate. The Tarrance Group was commissioned by American Federation for Children and the state affiliate to conduct a telephone survey of voters across the state of Nevada. A random sample of N=602 voters is likely to yield a margin of error of $\pm 4.1\%$ in 95 out of 100 times. A third of the interviews were conducted among cell phones. Responses to the survey were gathered August 15-18, 2015.

Nevada voters hold an overwhelmingly positive view of Education Savings Accounts. Respondents were told that "Earlier this year, Nevada created the nation's first universal education savings account program — which uses state funds to create a personal account for parents to fund education expenses, including tuition, tutoring, testing fees and books." Sixtyone percent of voters support it and a third (33%) strongly support it.

SUPPORT NEVADA'S ESA PROGRAM

Nevada's ESA program enjoys strong majority support from union households (60%) and Hispanic voters (71%) as well as majority support among Republicans (63%), Democrats (58%), and Independents (62%).

There are two aspects of the ESA program that are particularly popular. Overwhelming majorities support;

- "Giving students with special needs the opportunity to use additional state funds for specialized services and therapies" (86% favor/56% strongly), &
- "Giving some students access to private tutoring or private classes depending on their needs" (83% favor/51% strongly).

Voter support for school choice is also strong here, as 73% of voters favor of school choice, and 63% think it is either "extremely" or "very important." This is the bedrock of support against which the ESA program is received.

One of the biggest reasons that voters in the state support school choice is its ability to relieve overcrowding of schools. Two-thirds (66% more likely/41% strongly) of the voters are more likely to support ESA's because of the following message about school choice...

"Given the current overcrowding in Nevada's public schools, school choice programs will help relieve the strain and provide more classroom space for all students."

The results here strongly suggest that voters see the Education Savings Account program as an important part of school choice in the state. And both school choice and Education Savings Accounts are an important part of the answer in making education in the state better.
