HOW THE POLL WAS CONDUCTED

This poll was conducted by Mason-Dixon Polling & Research, Inc. of Jacksonville, Florida from June 5 through June 9, 2019. A total of 1,000 adults were interviewed nationwide by telephone.

Those interviewed were randomly selected from a list of working phone numbers that included both land-lines and mobile phones. Quotas were assigned in order to reflect adult population by state.

The margin for error, according to standards customarily used by statisticians, is no more than ±3.2 percentage points. This means that there is a 95 percent probability that the "true" figure would fall within that range if all adults were surveyed. The margin for error is higher for any subgroup, such as a gender or age grouping.

The survey includes 676 adults who indicated they were registered to vote. The margin for error among registered voters is ±3.8 percentage points.

QUESTION: Do you support or oppose a federal tax credit proposal in Congress where individuals and businesses could donate to non-profit scholarship granting organizations in the states that would provide scholarships for students to attend the public, private or career and technical schools of their choice?
