granting organization (SGO).

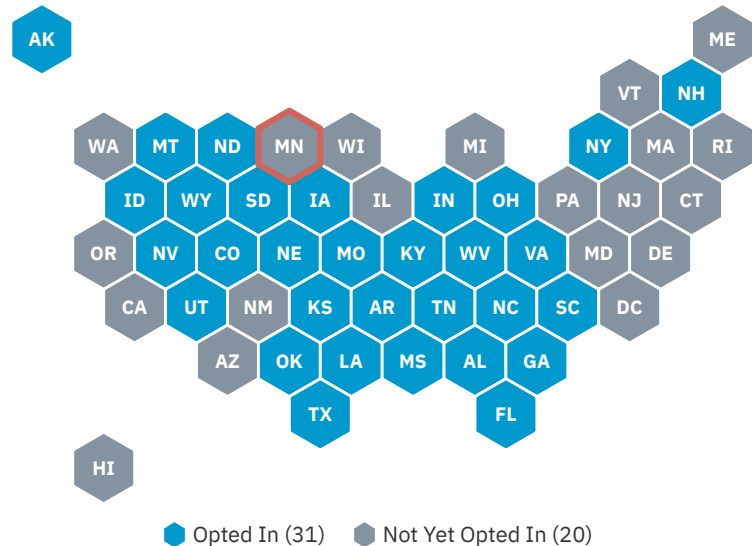
DONOR CLAIMS THE CREDIT

At filing, the donor claims the
dollar-for-dollar federal credit.

MINNESOTA BY THE NUMBERS

- **Minnesota has the 20th-largest eligible student population** in the country: 917,616 students.
- **Minnesota has not yet opted in.** Its 917,616 eligible students can receive scholarships only if the state opts in.
- **A first for Minnesota.** The state currently has no ESA, voucher, or tax credit scholarship program, and so the EFTC would bring private school choice to Minnesota families for the first time.
- **Most families qualify.** The income limit is 300% of area median income, which averages about \$364,000 for a family of four in Minnesota.
- **Students in public, private, and charter schools are eligible.**

WHICH STATES HAVE OPTED IN



SCHOLARSHIP DOLLARS FOR MINNESOTA STUDENTS

If Minnesota taxpayers with \$1,700 of tax liability redirect the full credit to an SGO, the dollars add up fast:

\$162.5 million

in scholarships every year if **10%** of taxpayers with \$1,700
of tax liability participate

\$487.4 million

in scholarships every year if **30%** of taxpayers with \$1,700
of tax liability participate
