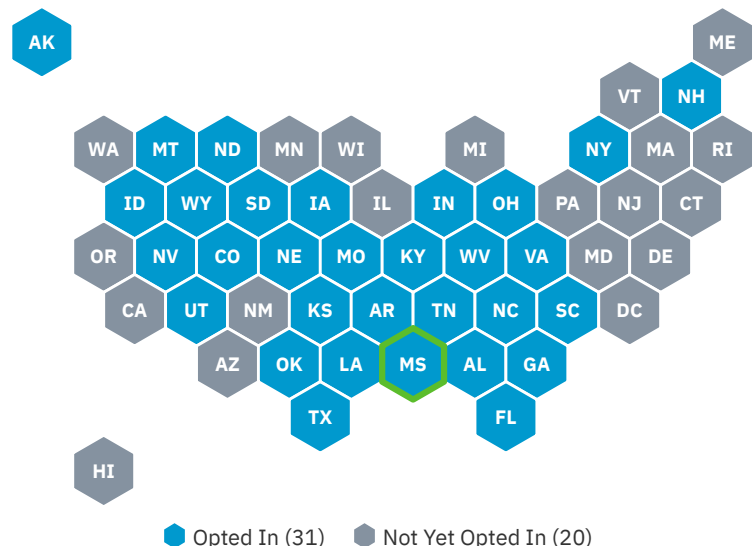
DONOR CLAIMS THE CREDIT

At filing, the donor claims the
dollar-for-dollar federal credit.

MISSISSIPPI BY THE NUMBERS

- **481,487 Mississippi students are eligible** for EFTC scholarships.
- **Mississippi has opted in.** Its 481,487 eligible students can receive scholarships after the tax credit launches.
- **The EFTC builds on existing options.** Mississippi families currently have state private school choice programs; the Education Freedom Tax Credit will layer on a new stream of scholarship support at no cost to the state budget.
- **Most families qualify.** The income limit is 300% of area median income, which averages about \$234,000 for a family of four in Mississippi.
- **Students in public, private, and charter schools are eligible**, in addition to homeschool students in Mississippi.

WHICH STATES HAVE OPTED IN



SCHOLARSHIP DOLLARS FOR MISSISSIPPI STUDENTS

If Mississippi taxpayers with \$1,700 of tax liability redirect the full credit to an SGO, the dollars add up fast:

\$44 million

in scholarships every year if **10%** of taxpayers with \$1,700
of tax liability participate

\$131.9 million

in scholarships every year if **30%** of taxpayers with \$1,700
of tax liability participate
